I have had the pleasure of being able to meet with other Club Presidents in our District and work together towards making District 9510 a cohesive, friendly and inviting organisation. We are all working towards strengthening our numbers for our respective Clubs, part of that is the combined Group 3 Brochure, listing all the Clubs in our part of the District.

Budget for 2024 – 25

The budget was set at \$15,000. I broke with tradition this year and communicated with the committee members online, at meetings, by phone or text instead of having regular meetings.

Marion Mental Health Rehabilitation Clinic

This past year Tony and Ri Nicholls have continued to manage this very worthy cause. They have received the request from the clinic, gone out and purchased the necessary items and then divided these items up into bags ready for distribution. Four deliveries were made for the year on July 11, October 10, January 31 and April 2. **Cost of project \$2,097.20**

Trees For Life

Andrew has continued to manage this project based at the Bookshop. He picked up enough seeds to plant six boxes totaling 360 seedlings which were delivered to the Trees For Life Nursery in March. In all about 30 hours of time was put in by volunteers, with special thanks to Prue, Pauline and David.



Operation Flinders

I introduced this group as the Clubs Major Community Project mainly because of what I had heard and then I saw first-hand their working operation on Yananiee Station some 685kms North of Adelaide. It was started by a school teacher named Pamela Murray White in 1991. Pamela was a teacher at Beafield School which was designed to support the re-engagement of students excluded by their enrolling schools for highly challenging behavioural and complexity problems. Through her initiative it has grown so much that they recently had their 10,000th young person go through the program. Groups such as schools nominate challenged students to form teams to go on this exercise to help them with direction in life and the challenges continually forthcoming in life. Some young people are not in a position to be a part of a team sponsored by a school and this is the type of individual we supported. **Cost \$7,500.**

Riding For The Disabled

As a second Major Project we sponsored maintaining a horse at Riding for the Disabled for a 12 month period. John and I had the privilege of choosing a horse to sponsor, but seeing between the both of us we did not have a clue on which one to choose, we consulted with a former jockey who was injured in a fall at Morphettville Races a few years ago, who came to our aid. The horses name is Yeti. **Cost of project \$3,000.**



St Phillips Anglican Parish Pop Up BBQ

We supplied our BBQ trailer and meat, onions and salads for this day, which is arranged each year to counsel, offers clothes, haircuts etc and a good feed for the homeless. **Cost of project \$400.**



Nunga Christmas at Warriparinga Event

At the Kaurua Cultural Centre Marion. This event provided a family oriented outdoor evening to help celebrate Christmas. We supplied the BBQ and volunteers to cook for approx 350 - 400 people. We purchased everything including meat, bread etc, and invoiced them as requested then we donated that amount back. **Cost of project \$500.**

Anzac Day Gunfire Breakfast

Our club members again fronted up nice and early (about 5.30am) for the Gunfire Breakfast at the Plympton Glenelg RSL for ANZAC Day. Thanks to Andrew for getting the BBQ to the RSL nice and early for the bright eyed Libby and Greg, Katsuni, Vicki and Andrew to cook where they excelled at feeding the hungry participants attending the Remembrance Service.



Rotary Action Group for Addiction Prevention

Jo Baxter gave a very interesting presentation on this subject. With her support I contacted many schools and colleges with a letter offering books for their library and guest speakers free of charge, but the feedback from the schools was so poor we abandoned further contact. I was very disappointed with the apathy and lack of support from the schools.

Bunnings BBQ's

What an amazing year we have had running these BBQ's about every two months. Filling the rosters has been a problem, but thanks to our wives, partners and Friends of Rotary we have usually had enough to cover each shift. **This year we have raised approx \$14,000.**



Marion Primary School Christmas Concert

We supplied and cooked a barbecue for their Annual Christmas Concert. We donated all of the food and the school received the proceeds from the sales. **Cost \$400.**



Jodi Lee Foundation Walkathon

This year the 80km Trek was from Parawa to Victor Harbor and then to Myponga, mostly along the Heysen Trail. We sponsored John Clements with a \$1,000 donation. His team raised \$5,000, and the Johnny Walkers \$7,000. The Weekend Fundraising Trek raised over \$170,000. The money raised goes toward educating people about Bowel Cancer and the importance of everyone being checked, because if diagnosed early 90% of cases can have a complete recovery. **Cost \$1,000.**

Vision of Islands

This project goes towards supporting the volunteer eye surgical and clinical teams who provide services free of charge in the Pacific islands, so far extending to Tonga and Tuvalu.

Biogas Project

Our biggest project this year, joining with the Rotary Club of Dhulikhel to assist the community of Bar Bardiya Municipality and Thakurbaba Municipality and High School for installation of 6 Square Cubic Metre size biogas systems to supplement the sustainable alternative cooking energy to replace firewood and expensive LPG gas. Thanks to John Price the club also gained a District Grant of \$3,000. The Club then funded the remaining amount of \$6,320 for this project. A special thankyou to John Price who not only secured the Rotary Grant but personally oversaw the project and then reported back to the Club once completed.

Wheelchairs for Kids.

Every child deserves the freedom of mobility, and a donation to Wheelchairs For Kids Australia makes that possible. Our support helps them manufacture all-terrain, adjustable wheelchairs for children in some of the most challenging environments and poorest communities. We donated sufficient funds to purchase one wheelchair.

Nepal Water filters

This ongoing project linked with other Rotary clubs, supplies ceramic water filters to improve the water quality to townships in Nepal, however this year they requested our support go towards the purchase of PVC pipe to repair the water supplies to the villages which were damaged by flooding.

New Generation and Youth Committee Chairperson 2024-2025

During this Rotary Year the Club Committee has been a little less proactive in supporting Rotary Youth programs in the Community for various reasons. The number of programs available under the Youth portfolio, are many and varied and it is not possible to support each and every one within our financial resources.

The following we did or will be supporting shortly:

Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA)

Only one RYLA seminar was held this year, 21-27 September 2024 and we had no applicants apply. We had an applicant apply for the next RYLA on 20-26 September 2025. Unfortunately, we have recently been advised that Synthia has had to withdraw. All is not lost as the RYLA registrar is looking for a replacement applicant for us to sponsor. **The Closing Date for acceptance is 31 August 2025.**




National Youth Science Forum (NYSF)

The Club helped sponsor Emilia Noriega, 16 years old and a Year 12 student attending Immanuel College to participate in the NYSF, which was held in Brisbane this year, from 15-23 January 2025. Emilia spoke at our Club on April 1st, after the Forum was finished and her training for her Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships in Coolangatta in March, and participation where she successfully represented South Australia. She is extremely passionate about **STEM** (which is a curriculum in four disciplines, integrating concepts that are usually taught as separate subjects; namely **S**cience, **T**echnology, **E**ngineering and **M**athematics). She hopes to study mechanical engineering at Flinders University, starting in 2026 and begin a career in Defence within this field. Her presentation was very well collated and appreciated by all present. She also assisted at a RC of Edwardstown Bunnings BBQ function and thanked the Club for their hospitality and support in enabling her to attend NYSF.



Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN)

We have indicated that we are interested in sponsoring Umme Hani to attend RYPEN from Friday 29 to Sunday 31 August 2025. RYPEN is a 3 day residential program of enrichment for young people 14 to 17 being held at the Nunyara Conference Centre and **applications close on 28 July 2025**. The program aims to provide opportunities for young people to develop important life skills, and to assist them to progress their communication and leadership skills through a range of formal and informal activities, such as ice-breakers, comedy skills, small group work, discussion forums, workshops and physical challenges and develop their public speaking skills, communication skills, problem solving skills, teamwork and others.



Youth Sailing Challenge (YSF)

We sponsored Sophia Briggs, a Year 11 student at St Aloysius College, to sail on the STV One & All wooden sailing ship on a voyage from Port Adelaide to Kangaroo Island and return, on 29 September to 3 October 2024. From a young age Sophia has been avidly fascinated in marine life and the unknowns of the deep. During the challenge, great life lessons are learnt and wonderful friendships formed. It involves learning the complexities of sailing, working as a team, while living without electronic communications in a maritime environment. She gave a presentation of her experience on the Sailing Challenge, of which she thoroughly enjoyed the experience. The first few days they sailed into a wild storm with many of the students becoming seasick, but those affected soon got over it and gained their sea-legs. Their arrival back in Port Adelaide was quite spectacular with many students high up in the sails waving to waiting family and friends and excited about relating their experiences to them.


Over the past 12 months we have continued to promote our Rotary Club with help from many of our members:

The placement of Emergency Medical Information Books at our Bookshop and at Neetan's Medical Centre has been successful.




We have liaised with The Maid of Auckland for signage "ROTARY MEETS HERE" to be placed at both the front and carpark hotel entrances.







Thanks to Amanda for designing our new brochures which are now in our Bookshop and at The Maid Hotel. Thanks also to Libby for organising the printing.

Rotary Book Exchange Report

The Rotary Book Exchange has had yet another successful year in 2024/25, despite a quiet 2 months leading up to Christmas, with roadworks on Towers Terrace, limiting the amount of passing traffic – despite this, our loyal customers still managed to find their way to us.

Sales for the 12 months were \$69,324, which is only slightly less than the previous year (\$71,228). Net profit for the same period was \$52,961, which is an increase on the previous year (\$52,167). \$56,000 has been transferred to the Club's Project account during the year.


The Rotary Book Exchange has now been operating for almost 27 years and in that time the net profit now exceeds \$1,000,000. We celebrated this milestone on June 11, and presented a lucky customer with a \$50 book voucher. We are hoping to hold a celebration BBQ at the Bookshop for our customers & volunteers when the weather is a bit warmer.



President Amanda's project this year included buying a television for the Bookshop to promote our Club, Rotary programs, and acknowledge supporting organisations. We update the information regularly and have received numerous positive comments from our customers.

The secret to the bookshop's success is due in no small way, to the 27 wonderful volunteers, who provide a friendly face and helpful advice to our customers. Libby & David continue to successfully manage the day to day running of the bookshop. We must also acknowledge our loyal customers & supporters, who donate their books - every single book in the shop has been donated. We have welcomed 3 new members to our Bookshop Board – Rob Fick and Bookshop Volunteers Judy Kowalik & Jude Searle. They expressed interest in joining the Board, following the resignation of Tony Nicholls who spent several years as a member – many thanks to Tony for his service.

Guy & Richard continue to collect our unsaleable books, whenever we ask. Our support for “The Boys” and the recycling of these books continues to be an enormous cost saver for the Bookshop and has assisted them to set up a thriving microbusiness. The Mentoring Project supported by John Chapman & Greg Carey, when the recycling commenced in 2021 was recently recognised at the Service Clubs of South Australia presentation lunch in March, where we were the winner of the Premier’s Community Service Social Inclusion award.



The City of Marion has continued to be a supportive landlord, responding to requests for maintenance issues. The garden has been a challenge this year, due to the lack of rain, and John & Greg are currently working on a watering system.

Our two half price sales this year have been very successful and assisted in reducing stock, ready for the next influx of donations. Our excess books go into street libraries and educational books support schools in remote villages in the Philippines.

Without our Bookshop, the Rotary Club of Edwardstown would not be able to support the many organisations both internationally & in our local community, that request our assistance. Congratulations to all who have assisted.

The Rotary Foundation Report

People may ask why we contribute to the Rotary Foundation each year.

The answer is simple – the Rotary Foundation is Rotary’s own charity, providing support to Rotarians and their Clubs to undertake projects that help to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace by improving healthcare, alleviating poverty, improving the environment and providing access to clean water & quality education.

This year our donation of \$2,310 to End Polio is matched 2 for 1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation – that is \$6,930, providing vaccinations to around 1,500 children, who would otherwise not be vaccinated.

Our contribution to the Annual Fund this year was \$3,000 – the money, from Clubs worldwide is invested for 3 years and at the end of that time 50% comes back to the District for District Grants and 50% goes to the World Fund.

Our application for a District Grant to assist with our Biogas Digester installations in Nepal this year was approved, and we received a grant for \$3,000. This wonderful project overseen by John Price has improved the lives of 14 families and one school in Bar Bardia District.



It is important that we continue to support the Rotary Foundation in the coming years, so that funds continue to be available to support the End Polio campaign and for District & Global Grants.

Treasurer's Report

In a year that saw many parts of Australia experiencing devastating weather events, including cyclones, flooding and severe drought, and ongoing international conflicts and concerns, members of Rotary Clubs around Australia continued to work tirelessly to contribute to projects that support local, national and international communities.

The substantial contribution of income from both the Bookshop and many Bunnings BBQs, and the hard work and dedication of the members of Rotary Club of Edwardstown, although few in numbers, played a significant role in supporting and funding so many worthwhile projects that enriched many people's lives in so many ways.

National and Local Projects: Financial support in excess of \$23,000 has been provided to local community projects including:

- Trees for Life,
- Drought relief for South Australian farmers
- One and All activities
- Operation Flinders
- Riding for the Disabled
- Marion Mental Health Rehabilitation Unit support
- Rotary Youth Programs (RYLA, RYPEN, NYSF, One & All)
- Other grants and sponsorships for local groups, charities and endeavours

International Projects: The Club has supported projects in:

- Nepal
- Philippines
- India
- Tanzania
- Vanuatu
- Pacific Islands

More than \$21,000 of Club funds have been distributed to these projects during this year.

Rotary Foundation: The Club continues to support Rotary Foundation programs including End Polio and the Annual Fund, contributing more than \$5,700 in the past 12 months.

Additionally, the Club has been able to secure Grants of \$3,600 from Rotary International and Government schemes.

A commendable effort considering the current social and economic environment.

A full Club and Bookshop financial summary will be distributed to members when available.




