Early on during the start of my year as president, Rob (our Secretary) and I grabbed a coffee and mapped out what we wanted from the year: a club where members genuinely enjoy being part of Rotary, and a goal of bringing in 3–4 new members. I'm proud to say we delivered on both.

None of this happens without our members' support and volunteers. Huge thanks to Libby & her team, Jeff and David and everyone who keeps the Bookshop running — it's our steady source of funds. And to everyone who turns up for Bunnings BBQs and other fundraisers — you keep the lights on.

Projects 2025/26

Vision of Islands — This Rotary project goes towards supporting the volunteer eye surgical and clinical teams who provide services free of charge in the Pacific islands, so far extending to Tonga and Tuvalu.

Donated \$500

Unicorpus Health Foundation Cataract Surgery — For a fourth time, a project we donated to the Indian non-profit organisation, Unicorpus Hospital, supporting cataract surgery to those within the community that are in need. Thank you to Rotarian Neetan for facilitating this project.

Donated \$4,000



RAWCS Aust/Nepal Combined Eye Camp — Donation to support RAWCS in collaborating with Nepali eye hospitals to deliver outreach programmes into remote communities, distribution of prescription spectacles, cataract surveillance and organising and funding of cataract surgery. Unfortunately, the camp in March 2026 was deferred until 2027, therefore the club donated the allocated funds towards supplies — for example, optic lens, eye drops and other equipment in preparation for the camps.

Tanzania — The mission of the Mama Paulina Mangare Foundation is to bridge the gap for underserved girl children by providing them with access to quality education and essential health services. Through a holistic approach, the organisation aims to empower these children not only to survive but to thrive. The club once again supported this worthy cause.

Nepal Water Filters — This ongoing project linked with other Rotary clubs supplying water filters to improve the water quality to townships in Nepal.

RARE (Rotary Australia Repurposing Equipment) — Donation towards the ongoing funding costs of the RARE facility at Edinburgh.

Donated \$2,250

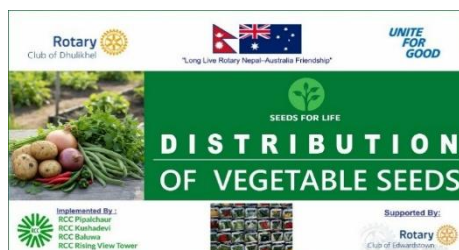

Financial Report

Net profit from the Book Exchange for the year was \$53,760 from sales of \$70,757 — an amazing result, with 76 cents in every dollar being net profit.

A total of \$54,000 was transferred to the Club Project account this year, to fund our local and overseas projects.

We recently submitted an EOI for a Commonwealth Volunteer Grant to replace our aging computer, software & printer, and have been notified that we have advanced to the next stage in the process, and a formal application has been submitted.

Once again, our costs for disposing of unsaleable books was NIL, thanks to our partnership with Richard & Guy. The books have a second life as kitty litter, and it has assisted Richard & Guy in the development of their micro business — a great community project.

Staffing

Libby & David have managed the Bookshop together, with assistance from Rotarians and other Volunteers. We sincerely thank all our Volunteers for their contribution to the Bookshop, and the cheerful way they interact with our customers. The Bookshop Committee meets quarterly to ensure the smooth running of the business.

Book Supplies

We continue to receive plentiful donations of books and have held 2 successful half-price sales during the year to turn over our stocks. Many charity op shops no longer accept books, which has necessitated us only accepting two small boxes or bags at a time, to ensure the occupational health & safety of our Volunteers.

Marion Business Award

The Bookshop was nominated for a Marion Business Award in the Community Club or Organisation category — and won. Libby accepted the plaque and certificate on the Club's behalf at a City of Marion event on 10 December 2025. This award reflects the outstanding contribution our volunteers make to the Bookshop's daily operations.

John Chapman & Greg Carey have installed a watering system, which has greatly improved the management of the garden area.

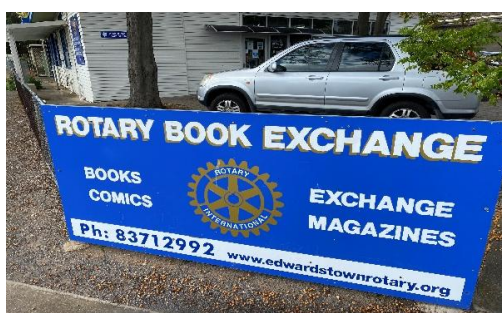
A working bee/social event held in October to empty the old shed and move any items to the small shed was very successful, and a shared lunch was enjoyed by all involved.

The Rotary Book Exchange is much loved by our local community, due in no small way to the 28 wonderful volunteers, who play such a big role in fundraising for RC Edwardstown — we really appreciate everything they do.

The Rotary Foundation — Annual Report

The Rotary Club of Edwardstown has continued its support of the Rotary Foundation again this year. Our annual donations transform into grants for service projects that change lives both close to home and around the world. In the past few years, we have been fortunate to receive many of these grants for our projects both internationally and in the local community.

Although we did not apply for a District grant this year, we were pleased to serve as the international sponsor for Global Grant GG2691901, the Rose Project. Valued at more than US\$50,000, the project will provide six dialysis machines to Sagayarani Hospital in India, where access to advanced healthcare is limited. Many people with kidney failure rely on regular dialysis to survive, yet often need to travel long distances for treatment. The project's main aim is to improve access to affordable, timely dialysis for rural, elderly and economically disadvantaged patients.

Our contribution to the Annual Fund this year was \$2,400, and our contribution to the End Polio Campaign was \$1,600. We are still so close to the eradication of polio, with Pakistan continuing to be the area of greatest challenge.

Youth Committee — Annual Report

Unfortunately, we have not been able to source applicants for the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF), Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) or Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN) in the 2025/26 Rotary year — we did, however, sponsor 15-year-old Mahnaz Nawrozi to take part in the 5-day One & All Sailing Challenge in April. Mahnaz came to a Club meeting a few weeks later, with her family, to tell us about her experience and the benefit she gained from this wonderful experience.



We have been able to source a student for the upcoming RYPEN camp in July. We will also be sponsoring Madison Phillips for RYLA in October 2026 — Madison was a guest speaker this year, telling us about Operation Flinders.

We wish both these young people our best wishes for a wonderful experience.

Budget for 2025–26 was set at \$25,000.

Marion Mental Health Rehabilitation Clinic — Again this year Tony and Ri Nicholls have continued to manage this very worthy cause. They have received the request from the clinic, gone out and purchased the necessary items and then divided these items up into bags ready for distribution. Their demand is getting greater. In addition, we packaged up 60 Christmas Gift bags which were really well received. Cost of project — \$3,672+.

Trees For Life — Andrew has continued to manage this project based at the Book Shop. He picked up 360 tubes of seedlings from the Tree For Life Nursery and planted one box of each Fragrant Saltbush, Southern Blue Gum, Mallee Box and Golden Wattle, and two boxes of River Red Gums. Because germination was not as successful as previous, excess seeds were used to make up the shortfall. Thanks to David Caig and the volunteers that assisted during the process. Trees For Life are very appreciative of the club's effort and impressed that Rotary was undertaking this as a community project.

Operation Flinders — I'm sure you will agree that sponsoring a young person again this year was a good move, especially after hearing Maddie Phillips speak on her life experiences and how much Operation Flinders changed her life. Coming from a not-so-pleasant upbringing, she has turned her life completely around under the guidance of the program, and she has completed theirs and many other courses and is now studying nursing at university. She has also accepted to attend the next RYLA weekend. Cost — \$7,500.

Riding For The Disabled — As a second Major Project we sponsored maintaining a horse at the above for another 12 months. They have put the Rotary emblem in both their newsletter, Facebook and on their website where they recognise their sponsors. Supporting our youth with challenging behavioural and complexity problems, as well as supporting a program assisting our disabled, is what we are all about. Cost of project — \$3,000.

Nunga Christmas at Warriparinga Event — At the Kaura Cultural Centre Marion. This event provided a family-orientated outdoor afternoon to help celebrate Christmas. We supplied the BBQ and volunteers to cook for approx. 350–400 people. We purchased everything including meat, bread etc., and invoiced them as requested, then we donated that amount back. Cost of project — \$500.

Anzac Day Gunfire Breakfast — Our club members again fronted up nice and early (about 5.30am) for the Gunfire Breakfast at the Plympton RSL for ANZAC Day. Thanks to John for getting the BBQ to the RSL nice and early for the bright-eyed Libby and Greg, Vicki and Andrew, to cook and who excelled and fed the hungry participants attending the Remembrance Service.

Bunnings BBQ's — What an amazing year we have had running these BBQ's about every two months. Filling the rosters has been a problem, but thanks to our wives, partners and Friends of Rotary we have usually had enough to cover each shift. This year we have raised approx. \$10,000, which is down on last year, mainly due to fewer BBQ's being rostered.

Marion Primary School Christmas Concert — We supplied and cooked a barbecue for their Annual Christmas Concert. We donate all of the food and the school received the proceeds from the sales. Costs — approx. \$400. We also donated another Buddy Bench at a cost of \$1,800.

Jodi Lee Foundation Walkathon — This year the 80km Trek ran between McLaren Vale along the Henson Trail through the Kiopo Forest area. We again sponsored John Clements with a \$1,000 donation. His team raised approx. \$6,687, and the Johnny Walkers \$9,944, and the Weekend Fundraising Trek raised over \$241,812. The money raised goes toward educating people on Bowel Cancer and the importance of everyone being checked, because if diagnosed early, 90% of cases can have a complete recovery. John also walked the Portuguese Camino Trail, raising \$12,291 — a mighty effort.

Multi Cultural "Australia Day" BBQ — We cooked for approx. 600+ at the North Adelaide new Aquatic Centre for the Australia Day Council, who supplied the food. They have offered four Annual Memberships of both North Adelaide and Marion Aquatic Centres to be used as fund-raisers in appreciation.

Defibrillator for Corner Uniting Church — We received a request for a new unit, which was presented to them by John Chapman. We did receive a letter of thanks. Cost — \$1,700.

Meals on Wheels — Thank you to all of the volunteers who deliver Meals on Wheels at Edwardstown every Thursday — this is serving the community at its best.

Shelterbags for Homeless through Vinnies — Tony Nicholls, who volunteers for Vinnies, explained that they had been supplying food to many people who were destitute and/or homeless, and there was a great need for some form of shelter for the homeless. We supplied 15 shelterbags. Cost — \$1,500.

Craniofacial Night — We held a special dinner meeting and had three representatives come along and inform us first-hand about Craniofacial and the excellent work they are doing to help those in need. Guest Speaker Damian DeWitt shared his story of how he had an accident at 25yo and what Craniofacial did to rebuild his life. Cost — \$5,000.

SA School for Visually Impaired — Last year we donated \$500 to the Braille Music Camp Concert, which is in this year's financials. Sandra Patridge spoke at one of our meetings and did such a great job informing us of the benefits this Camp offered people from the whole State, that it was decided to sponsor the whole event. Ten members and partners attended their Concert. Cost — \$5,000.

Other Donations — Treasure Boxes \$500 (they were in urgent need of funds); RAWCS Farmers Drought \$2,000 (a donation to help purchase feed); RAWCS \$1,000 (a paraplegic Rotarian in Berri who needed a vehicle to get to Adelaide for appointments); Catherine House \$1,500 (offers women in crisis longer-term accommodation and support services for women over 18yo); Hutt Street Homeless (helping those who have nowhere to go, a roof over their head and a feed and counselling); Marion LIFE \$500 (they help anyone in need — a great organisation).
